What steps must I take to obtain or renew a General Explosives Permit - Individual?	Complete an online application, insert all required documents and make payment. The application is available on the following site: Explosifs - Sûreté du Québec (gouv.qc.ca)
How much does a General Explosives Permit - Individual cost?	The fees will be indicated automatically during your online request.
What is the duration of a General Explosives Permit - Individual?	The permit is issued for a period of five (5) years maximum.
Is there a minimum age to apply for a general explosives permit - Individual?	Yes. You must be at least 18 years old.
What steps must I take if I find that my General Explosives Permit - Individual is no longer in my possession?	If your general explosives permit is lost or stolen, you must report the situation to the local police station in the region where it occurred. After the report, you must submit a permit replacement request with the online service on the site Explosifs - Sûreté du Québec (gouv.qc.ca) A \$10 fee applies to replace your General Explosives Permit - Individual.

Questions	Answers
Why does the Sûreté du Québec issue general explosives permits to companies?	Over the last few years, incidents in the explosives industry highlighted the fact that certain legislative provisions were not being enforced. These events, which could have had major impacts on the public safety, emphasized the need for a thorough application of the provisions of the <u>Act respecting explosives</u> .
	This Act provides a mechanism to ensure that companies possessing explosives will own a general explosives permit (CQLR, chapter E-22, section 11.1). Previously, the permit was issued to the representative of the company rather than to the company itself. In order to help promote public safety, the permit is now issued under the company's name. The company is accountable for the explosives under its care.
What does section 11.1 of the Act respecting explosives say?	"Where the person who is required to hold a permit is a legal person, the issue or maintenance of the permit is subject to the requirement that, in addition to the legal person, each of the directors and each of the shareholders holding 10% or more of the shares with full voting rights also fulfil all the conditions." (Act respecting explosives, CQLR, chapter E-22, section 11.1).

Questions	Answers
What steps must we take if we note that our General Explosives Permit - Company is no longer in our possession?	If your general explosives permit is lost or stolen, you must report the situation to the local police station in the region where it occurred.
	After the report, you must submit a license replacement request using the online service on the site: <u>Explosifs - Sûreté du Québec (gouv.qc.ca)</u>
	A \$10 fee applies to the replacement of a <i>General Explosives Permit - Company</i> .
Must we list the names of all company directors in Annex 1 of the form Application for a general explosives permit - Company (SQ-3104A)?	Yes . All the company directors listed in <i>Registre des</i> entreprises du Québec (REQ) must be indicated in Annex 1, even those who reside outside Québec or Canada.
Must we list the names of all company shareholders in Annex 1 of the form Application for a general explosives permit - Company (SQ-3104A)?	No. Only shareholders holding 10% or more of the shares with full voting rights have to be listed.
What should we do if a shareholder is a legal person?	The name of the legal person or of the company must be listed in Annex 1.
Are company directors and shareholders holding 10% or more of the shares with full voting rights required to hold a General Explosives Permit - Individual?	Company directors and shareholders subject to the application of section 11.1 of the <u>Act respecting explosives</u> are not required to hold a <u>General Explosives Permit - Individual</u> in order for their company to hold a <u>General Explosives Permit - Company</u> . They only have to meet all the eligibility requirements for a general explosives permit.
	However, a <i>General Explosives Permit - Company</i> issued to the company does not grant its directors and its shareholders the privilege to possess explosives. If they wish to do so, they must personally hold a <i>General Explosives Permit - Individual</i> .

Questions	Answers
On what grounds would a company director or shareholder not be eligible for a general explosives permit?	Under section 13 of the <u>Act respecting explosives</u> : "The member of the Sûreté du Québec <u>must refuse</u> to issue the permit if an applicant, within the five (5) years preceding the application, has been convicted of:
	 an indictable offence under the Criminal Code (Revised Statutes of Canada, 1985, chapter C- 46);
	2. an offence under Part II, III or IX or under any of sections 430 to 437 of the Criminal Code other than an offence punishable on summary conviction only;
	3. an offence under section 48 of the Food and Drugs Act (Revised Statutes of Canada, 1985, chapter F-27) or an offence under paragraph b of subsection 2 of section 3 or any of sections 3.1 to 6 of the Narcotic Control Act (Revised Statutes of Canada, 1985, chapter N-1);
	4. an offence referred to in paragraph 3a or 4a of section 4, paragraph 3a or 3b(i) of section 5, paragraph 3a or 3b(i) of section 6, paragraph 2a, 2b or 2c(i) of section 7, paragraph 2a of section 8 or paragraph 2a of section 9 of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (Statutes of Canada, 1996, chapter 19); []
	Such grounds do not, however, apply if the applicant has obtained a pardon in respect of that offence or indictable offence."
	Under section 13.1 of the <u>Act respecting explosives</u> :
	"The member of the Sûreté du Québec <u>may refuse</u> to issue the permit if the applicant, within the five years preceding the application, has been convicted of an offence under this Act, the Explosives Act (Revised Statutes of Canada, 1985, chapter E-17) or the regulations thereunder unless the applicant has obtained a pardon in respect of that offence.
	The member of the Sûreté du Québec may also refuse to issue a permit where he is of the opinion: 1° that a permit should not be issued to the applicant
	on grounds of public security; 2° that the application is being made on behalf of another person."
What if a company director is not eligible for a general explosives permit?	The general explosives permit will be refused.
What if a shareholder holding 10% or more of the shares with full voting rights is not eligible for a general explosives permit?	The general explosives permit will be refused.
Who are the company agents to be named in Annex 2 of the form Application for a general explosives permit - Company (SQ-3104A)?	Agents designated in Annex 2, other than the company's directors and shareholders, can apply for a permit to store, sell or transport explosives on behalf of the company.

Is there a limit to the number of agents designated for a company?	No . There is no limit to the number of agents designated by a company to apply for a permit to store, sell or transport explosives on its behalf.

Permit to store, sell or transport explosives	
Questions	Answers
What steps must I take to obtain a permit to store, sell or transport explosives?	Complete the form <u>Application for a permit to sell, store or transport explosives - Company and Individual</u> (SQ-621-509A).
	 Contact the <u>Sûreté du Québec station</u> serving the region where the operation is located in order to make an appointment with an explosives inspector. A preliminary inspection is required before this type of permit is issued.
	 If applicable, provide the federal explosives magazine licence.
	Note: The applicant must be an agent authorized by a company.
How much does a permit to store, sell or transport explosives cost?	Confirm the fees on the Sûreté du Québec website, section "Procédure pour demander un permis":
	Explosifs - Sûreté du Québec (gouv.qc.ca)
	The <u>exact amount</u> of the payment must be made to Ministre des Finances du Québec using a certified cheque , a company cheque or a money order .
	This information is also available through the general information number of the Bureau du contrôle des armes à feu et des explosifs at 514 598-4584.
What steps must I take if I find that I no longer have my permit to store, sell or transport explosives?	If your permit to store, sell or transport explosives is lost or stolen, you must report the situation to the local police station in the region where it occurred.
	After reporting the situation, you must refill the <u>Application for a permit to sell, store or transport explosives - Company and Individual</u> (SQ-621-509A). Do not forget to include the police report number in the corresponding field.
What steps must I take to replace my permit to store, sell or transport explosives?	Complete the <u>Application for a permit to sell, store or transport explosives - Company and Individual</u> (SQ621-509A), and check the box for a replacement request.
	 Enclose a payment of exactly \$10 made to Ministre des Finances du Québec using a certified cheque or a money order.
	 Contact the <u>Sûreté du Québec station</u> serving the region where the operation is located in order to make an appointment with an explosives inspector.
